Jekel, Pamela, "Deepwater: A Novel of the Carolinas" (Kensington Books, 1994).

This is the story of Tess Hancock, whose family carves out a fragile future in an untamed wilderness. It is a cruel trick of fate that makes practical Tess, not her pretty, wilful sister, the bride of Jack Dobbs, a dashing ex-privateer.

This is a book about varieties of desire. Its heroine is a painter, Georgia Whyte, an American who has fled the turbulence of Los Angeles and Chicago for the anonymity of Europe. As intensely American as a senior prom, this is a big, crowded novel about six women, best friends since high school, now in their forties and still girls. They've been close to each other forever. Is there anything they don't know about each other?

This is the story of five Blackfoot Indians in the town of Blossen and its nearby reserve where very different lives nevertheless continually cross. This is a rich tale, weaving subtle, magical humor, revisionist history, muted
