Junior groomsmen were Benjamin Powell, Tripp Huffstetler and Jon Powell.

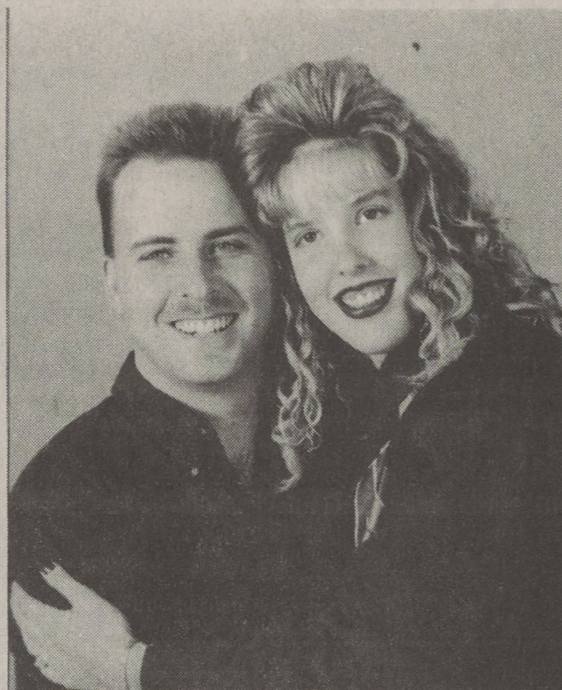
A reception was held after the ceremony at Club Carolina in Cherryville.

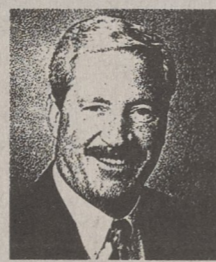
