The Cleveland County Chapter of the American Red Cross will participate in the area's third annual 'Marrow-thon" Saturday, August 19 from 9 a.m.-2 p.m. at Shelby Presbyterian Church.

The event is being sponsored by WCNC-TV Channel 36,STAR 104.7, and The Charlotte Post.

Participants in the 1995 Marrow-thon will become a part of the National Marrow Donor Program's registry of potential marrow donors. Last year more than 2,700 donors signed up in the single day, 11-county event.

This year, 12 sites will be available in Burke, Cabarrus, Catawba, Cleveland, Gaston, Iredell, Lincoln, Mecklenburg and Union counties in North Carolina, and Lancaster and York counties in South Carolina.

The Marrow-thon is an opportunity for people to become a part of a nationwide network of people who are willing to donate their healthy bone marrow to someone whose only chance for life is a transplant.
