Million Dollar shootout set at Challenger 3

The Junior Charity League of Shelby will sponsor a Million Dollar Hole-in-One Shootout September 13-17 at Challenger 3 Golf Course, 1650 N. Post Road, Shelby.

The proceeds will benefit the Clothing Room. The Shootout has rapidly become recognized as one of the most successful fundraisers for charities across the country. Last year's event at Challenger Three clothed in excess of 600 children in Cleveland County.

"It is fun to be involved in a golf related activity that will help clothe the needy children of Cleveland County," project co-chair Mille Spangler said.

The Shootout works much like a closest to the pin contest. Some eight tees will be set up at Challenger 3 Golf Course during the competition. Golfers will pay \$1 per ball to shoot at a special green from approximately 150 yards. Ten lucky golfers will qualify for Sunday's finals. Any golfer shooting a hole-in-one in the final will win \$1 million.

There will be a youth division offered for ages 8-12 and 13-17. One non cash prize will be awarded in each youth group for the person closest to the hole in the final shootout.

Adults will shoot for daily prizes for the closest to the hole, and all golfers landing a ball within the designated area during the qualifying days will be eligible for the semi-finals. The top 10 qualify for the finals.

Adults must be at least 18 years old to enter. Club and touring pros are not eligible.

Qualifying rounds are scheduled for Wednesday and Thursday, Sept. 13-14, from 3-8:30 p.m.; Friday, Sept. 15 from 1-8:30 p.m.; Saturday, Sept. 16 from 9 a.m.-8:30 p.m.; and Sunday, Sept. 17 from 1-5 p.m. The semi-finals and finals will be Sunday, Sept. 17 at 5 p.m.

Crest has won the last two battles with KM, including a lop-sided 28-0 victory last year in Kings Mountain. But Stewart said it's going to be much harder to prepare for the Mountaineers than it has been in the past.

"I'm very impressed with what they've done as far as putting a very well-balanced attack on the field," Stewart said. "They're forcing you to have to really work to get ready for them. It's no more three yards and a cloud of dust."

"On defense, they're in a 4-3 which makes it extremely hard to block. That's why we use that defense too. There are so many things you can do with it. We mirror each other in a lot of ways."

Massey said the Mountaineers' big goal Friday night - and for the remainder of the non-conference schedule - will be to show improvement and gain confidence for the upcoming Southwestern 3-A Conference race.

"What we're doing is looking at these first four games as an opportunity to get better before going into the conference," Massey said.

There were still some anxious moments, though, as the Chargers mis-handled the first down snap and the ball popped loose in the endzone. Crest players fell on the ball for a safety. Burns had time for one play after the free-kick, but Lawhon, attempting to pass, lost the handle on the football and had to fall on it as the game ended.

Crest ran up over 200 yards of offense, led by Anthony Davis with 116 yards rushing and Smith with 5-of-6 passes and 82 yards in the first half. Sherwin Brown led Burns with 147 yards in 19 carries.

"We were very pleased with a lot of things, and very displeased with a lot of things," Stewart said. "The hard part is you don't know whether the weather did some of those things or not. We're not real sure where we are."

"Overall, Anthony Davis ran the ball real well for us," he said. "Our quarterback threw the ball real well while we still had dry footballs. I thought the offensive line did a very good job. We had over 200 yards offense and on a night like that, that's not bad at all. We just didn't put the ball in the endzone as much as we needed to."

"Defensively, we had some real good plays but didn't tackle as well as we should. Rocky Kimble had a very good ballgame for us, and Shamar Finney and Brandon Kale at linebacker did real well. There are some things I'm not happy with, but as a coach there's always things I'm not happy with. I found things in the state championship game I wasn't happy with."
