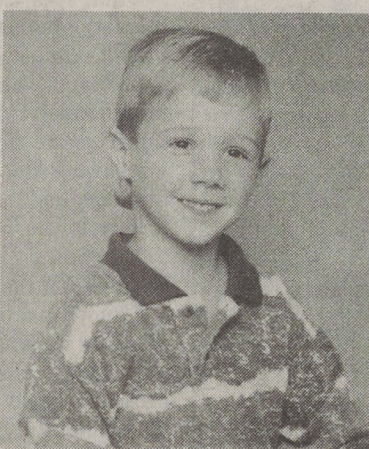


MARY-ASHTON TREECE

The Fair opens today and tomorrow from 6-11 p.m. and on Saturday from 3 p.m. until midnight.

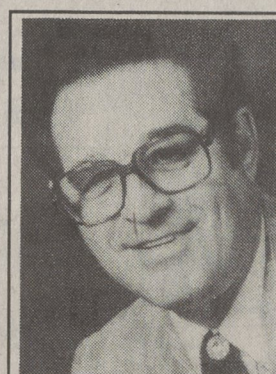
County Fair opens Sept. 28

A birthday party was held for 25 friends at her home in Motta, Sicily.

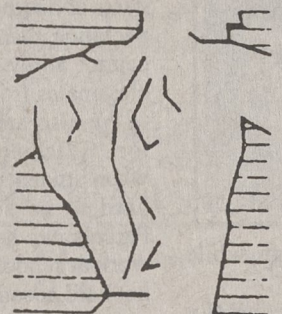
While visiting Kings Mountain, she also enjoyed a pool party for family and friends at the home of her grandparents on El Bethel Road on August 10.

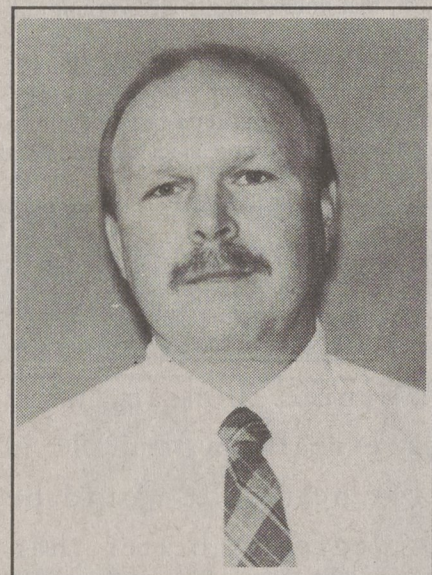
