Film collector Philip White of Cliffside tracked down the photographer some years ago while he was helping plan an anniversary celebration for Cliffside School.

After some research the Cliffside Principal found the original cameraman H. Lee Waters and over 100 hours of original footage and reels stored in Waters' carport in Lexington. White secured all the footage that Waters had shot in
