

Resolution keeps Military Park open

A "continuing resolution" signed by President Clinton and the US Congress keeps the Kings Mountain National Military Park open at least until November 17 but after that who knows what will happen.

KM Supt. Mike Loveless said he has been sweating out the recent developments by the government and has been in a quandary about planning the upcoming 215th anniversary celebration of the Revolutionary War Battle of Kings Mountain on Saturday at 3 p.m. at the Park amphitheater.

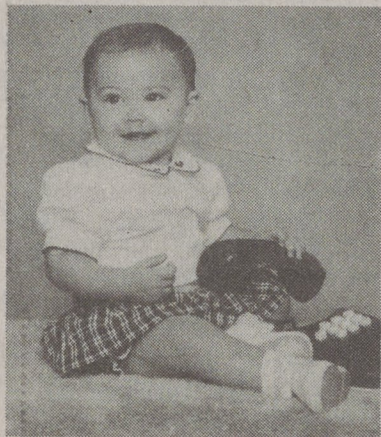
"At first we didn't know if we would be open to have a celebration," he said.

"At first they were threatening from a standpoint of the budget but the newest wrinkle sounds like we are still in danger that passage of a Park Reform Act will close down or curtail operations at 305 parks in the nation," he said this week.

Loveless said the first wave of threats to close the park ended with a narrow 51-vote turnaround and what he called a resolution of continuation of support of the administration, including the Department of Interior, and parks by the President and Congress.

"Now some legislator has inserted into a new bill a proposal to shut down as many as 305 parks in the nation," he said.

"We don't know what's coming for us but we all know the importance of keeping this Park open and are appreciative of the efforts of Kings Mountain people to contact their legislators during the first wave of threats to close the park."

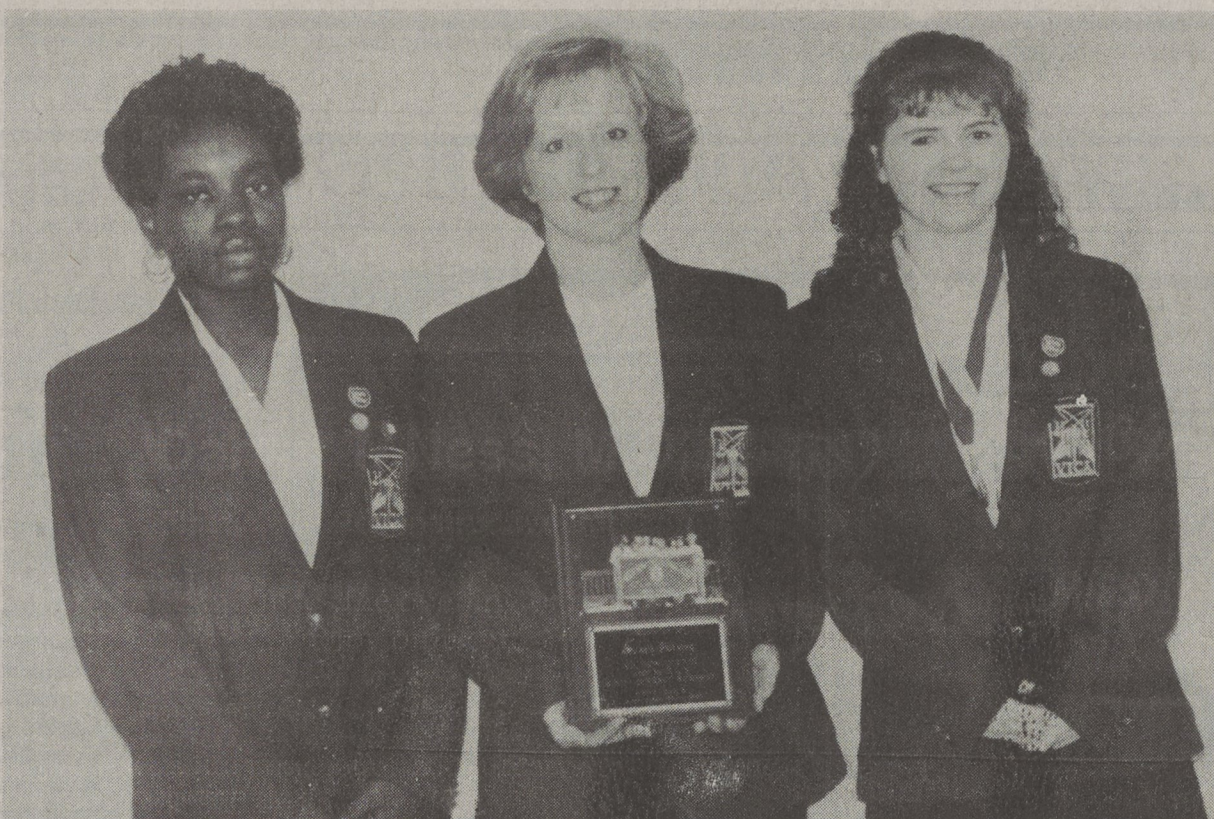
Justin Thomas Chapman was born August 28, 1995 at Cleveland Memorial Hospital. He weighed seven pounds and was 19 inches long.

Hicks accepted Bagley's resignation, effective October 13.

Bagley will take the position of manager of Success Inc., a family counseling and outreach program in Gastonia.

Bagley came to Kings Mountain

from Philip Morris Co. in Cabarrus County where he had worked three years as training facilitator. Prior to that he was Associate Dean of Students at Gaston College and before that worked with the Gaston County Department of Social Services. He completed his undergraduate degree at Western Carolina University and his graduate degree at UNC in Chapel Hill. He and his wife, Rachel, and their six-year-old son, Andrew, reside in Gastonia.

Hord's new position was effective Monday and leaves a va-

cancy in the athletic department at the Community Center. The city is currently taking applications for the positions of Director of Human Resources, athletic director and a grounds maintenance position, both at Parks & Recreation, and for sanitation employees, leaf collectors, a gas line mechanic and police and fire reserves.
