J. OLLIE HARRIS SR.

Former Kings Mountain Senator John Oliver Harris Sr., 82, of 921 Sharon Dr., died February 9, 1996 at Gaston Memorial Hospital of a blood clot arising from complications from cellulitis. He had entered the hospital February 6 after developing inflammation in his left

Born September 2, 1913 in Anderson, SC, he was the son of J. Frank and Jessie Hambright Harris. His mother was a direct descendant of the Revolutionary War hero Colonel Frederick Hambright who served in the North Carolina General Assembly in 1775.

Harris attended grammar school in Anderson and moved to Shelby in 1927 to live with his grandparents, J. Frank Harris Sr. and Genie Miller Harris. He graduated from Shelby High School in 1931.

His first job was with the Lutz-Jackson Funeral Home in 1928 which became the Lutz-Austell Funeral Home in 1933 and he worked there until 1947 when he opened his own business in Kings Mountain.

In 1934, Harris married Abbie Jane Wall of Shelby and graduated from Gupton-Jones College of Embalming, Nashville, Tn. He became licensed as an embalmer and funeral director in 1935.

In 1943, Harris entered the US Army and took basic training at Camp Barkley, Texas and Surgical Technician training at Fort Sam Houston. He went overseas in the European Theater of Operations in October 1944, serving in France, Belgium, Luxembourg, Germany and Austria with the 65th Field Hospital as a Surgical Technician and Staff Sergeant. Sgt. Harris was serving in Bostogne, Belgium during the Battle of the Bulge in December 1944 and earned the Bronze Star for services beyond the call of duty. Discharged in December 1945 at Fort Bragg, he returned to Shelby as an employee of Lutz-Austell Funeral Home.

In 1946 Harris assisted in the organization of the Veterans of Foreign Wars in Shelby and became its first elected Commander and was elected Coroner of Cleveland County and served until 1970. He was elected president of the N.C. Coroner's Association in

In July 1947 Harris became the owner of Harris Funeral Home in Kings Mountain. He bought the H. Tom Fulton Mortuary on Cherokee Street and a year later leased the 1917 Allison home on North Piedmont Avenue beside old City Hall, now the Kings Mountain Police Department. Major renovations included a new chapel in

In 1954 he was elected a member of the N.C. State Board of Embalmers and was president of the group in 1958. In 1960 he was elected president of the North Carolina Funeral Directors Association and served one term.

Harris, a 50-year member of the American Legion, served as Commander of Kings Mountain American Legion Post 155 and Kings Mountain Veterans of Foreign Wars, as president of the Kings Mountain Lions Club, the Kings Mountain Red Cross Chapter and as a trustee of Gardner-Webb University. He is a member and former chairman of the board of deacons at Kings Mountain Baptist Church and a retired volunteer member of the Kings Mountain Fire Department and also previously served in the Shelby Volunteer Fire Department. an honorary member of the Kings Mountain Kiwanis Club.

A lifetime of Democratic activism led Harris to run for the Senate in 1970, giving up the county coroner's job he held since 1946. He served for 18 years in the 25th Senatorial District that included Cleveland, Gaston and Rutherford counties from 1971-72, 1975-90 and in 1993-94 for two years in the new 37th District that includes Cleveland and Rutherford Counties. He was by then known as the "dean of the N. C. Senate." He became the chairman of the Human Resources Senate Committee in 1977 and served 14 years. He was chairman of the pensions and retirement committee in

Due to his leadership in mental health, he won the Valand Award in 1979, the Outstanding Legislator Award in the field of Public Health by the North Carolina Association of Health Departments in 1979 and the Outstanding Legislator award by the North Carolina Health Care Association in 1979.

He was vice-chairman of the Senate ways and means and the senior citizens and rules committees, banking and judiciary I and appropriations committees and the University board of Governors. He was a member of the Mental Health Study commission, the Mental Health, Mental Retardation, Alcohol and Drug Abuse commissions and the governmental operations committees. He also served on the legislative services, social service and emergency medical service commissions At 82 Harris held the record of holding public office longer than any other person in Cleveland County, 44

He was nominated by former Governor James Martin and the State Medical Society to receive the national Nathan Davis Award which credited him for helping bring major improvements in the state's institutions for the mentally handicapped. He was active on the advisory board of Western Carolina Center, the institution for the mentally retarded in Morganton and was instrumental in a drive to build a chapel. In November 1992.

Harris was elected to his 10th term in the N.C. Senate, the first person to be elected from the newly formed district composed of Cleveland and Rutherford

He was honored in his home district in 1993 by having the newly completed Cleveland County Mental Health Building named in his honor.

Surviving are his wife, Abbie Jane Wall Harris; one son, Ollie Harris Jr. of Nassau Bay, Texas; one daughter, Becky Harris of Kings Mountain; four grandchildren, Johnny Harris, Elizabeth Harris, David Hambright and Kathy Blanton; two great-grandchildren, Jada Blanton and Phillip Carter; and one sister, Helen Folsom of Hendersonville.

Moss Lake Commission has re-

secretary at last Monday's meeting. The newly-appointed members Dave Allen, Tommy King and Gary Joy were sworn in by notary Shirley Payne and new planning director Killian was introduced by

interim director Jeff Putnam. The board approved a request from Geneva Dedmon and Ramon and Sherrill Bradey to cut underbrush and weeds, gain access to the water line and burn excess brush at the Dedmon Properties on Sandy

Point Drive at the lake. Two proposed amendments to ordinances were discussed and both were tabled for further study and possible action at the next meeting. The first amendment would change the language in an ordinance to permit the building inspector rather than the city engineer to either accept or not accept the use of alternative materials on boat docks. The second would require property owners to place street addresses at the lake's edge. Members questioned whether signs would be standardized, what is the proper size and how to get the

lessee to use a standardized sign. Finance Officer Maxine Parsons informed the board that the budget year for the commission which ends on April 30 came about when the commission was the Lake Authority and that the city's budget year ends on June 30. She requested a need to change the end of the fiscal year from April 30 to June 30 to synchronize the Moss Lake budget and the city's budget. The seven-member board unani-

mously accepted the change. Parsons also suggested that the commission do its budget planning prior to the city council budget planning session in the spring.

Parsons reported on the lake lease agreements and the possibility of updates. Members discussed the rate of increase and whether the rates are high enough and tabled action for further discussion.

Upon motion by Gary Joy and seconded by Wendell Bunch, an application from William McMurrey for new projection limits on Lot 40, Stony Point Cove at Vernell Lane, was approved. Champion said he was the original land designer for the development and now has no financial interest in the project. He abstained from voting on the mater.

Killian reported that another NCDOT workshop on the North Carolina 74 Bypass project would likely be held in March, April or May this year.

A voluntary workshop for new members was slated for Monday at Town & Country Barbecue.
