Masters of Ceremonies for the event, open to the public, will be Jerry Bumbaugh and Bob Fryer. The evening will include a silent auction of art work by local artists and refreshments provided by the board of directors of the Cleveland County Arts Council.

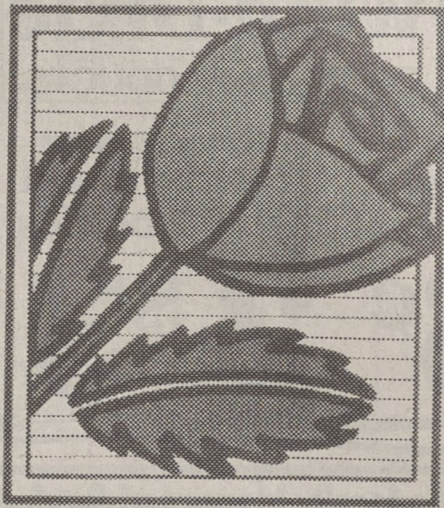
Auxiliary to plan annual Poppy Day
