# Hawkins, Windjammers honored by Nine Who Care

Recently, WSOC-TV honored Ronald Hawkins, volunteer for Youth Assistance Program, and Windjammers Motorcycle Club at the Nine Who Care awards luncheon at the Adam's Mark Hotel in Charlotte. Twenty-seven nominees from a 14-county region were recognized.

Hawkins has volunteered or the past eight years in YAP, the Governor's one-on-one program which matches adults with youth who are court-involved or "at-risk." He spends approximately 20 hours a month with youth providing leadership and re-direction. Hawkins said the youth he has worked with have experienced positive changes in their family relationship and their performance at school, verifying his belief that there is always hope. Hawkins also volunteers with other groups.

The Windjammers Motorcycle Club has volunteered for Children's Homes of Cleveland County for the past seven years. They raise money throughout the year to provide Christmas presents for every Cleveland County child in foster care, to provide funds for special needs of children and to provide the household needs for the Children's Home. Because of their work, yearbooks are purchased, residents go to camp and sports equipment is purchased.

All of the club's work culminates in the "Toy Run" on the second Sunday of December. Forty-one members recruit other motorcycle clubs in the community resulting in the event having more than 175 motorcycles and over 250 participants.
