New historical fiction at Mauney Memorial Library:

Backer, June. "The Journey West; Love is a Gentle Stranger" (Inspirational Press, 1996).

Backer writes with touching in-sight into her character, their struggles, and their time, reminding us powerfully of timeless family values we hold so dear.

Biggins, John. "The Two Headed Eagle" (St. Martin's Press, 1993). This is the story of five months

of hair raising adventure on the Italian front in which young Otto Prohasha entrusts his life to the nascent, unreliable, and terrifying Imperial and Royal Austria-Hungarian Flying Service.

Cowell, Stephen. "The Players; A Novel of Young Shakespeare" (W.W. Norton, 1997).

This graceful historical novel traces Shakespeare's path of cre-ative and emotional self-discovery, focusing on his apprentice years and concluding before the great plays that would earn him his fame.

Coyle, Harold. "Until the End; A Novel of the Civil War" (Simon & Schuster, 1996).

As the Civil War grinds on, claiming more lives and crushing the spirits and hopes of those who endure it, the Boman family comes to understand, with ever increasing poignancy, that even if they sur-vive, the world that they knew will never be regained, that their futures have become as uncertain as their own survival. Yet each resolved to carry on as best they can until the end.

Gabaldon, Diana. "Drums of Autumn" (Delacorte Press, 1997).

Cast ashore in the American colonies, the Frasers are faced with a bleak choice; return to a Scotland fallen into famine and poverty, or seize the challenge of a new life in the New World.

Hoff, B.J. "The Penny Whistle" (Bethany House, 1996).

Welcome to Shingle Creek, a Kentucky coal mining town in the late 1880's, where a beloved teacher hovers on the precipice between hope and despair. Two young friends plan to give a gift that may save his life.

Inman, Robert. "Dairy Queen Days" (Little, Brown and Company, 1997). In the grand tradition of Southern story telling, Inman weaves a rich and evocative tale of a teenage boy's struggle to forge his own identity beneath the searing Georgia summer sun of 1979.

Kelton, Elmer. "Cloudy in the West" (Forge, 1997).

Twelve-year-old Joey Shimman, growing up in the East Texas bad-lands of 1885, has more of a burden to bear than most boys his age.

Set against the devastation of post-World War II Europe, this is a love story of a young Polish under-ground veteran, Manya Gerson, who feels anti-Jewish violence in his country for the safety of a dis-placed persons camp in allied occupied Germany. Here she meets Emmanuel Kozak and Belek Holzor, and must make a choice.

Moss, Robert, "The Interpreter" (Forge, 1997).

In an epic adventure of mythic power, Moss tells the story of Pennsylvania's Indian agent during the French and Indian War. Conrad Weisir was one of America's greatest pioneers. Moss brings to live a world of wonder and horror, dreams and music, love and strife, in a powerful novel of the crucible in which America was born.

Munn, Velia. "Seminole Song" (Forge, 1997).

A powerful story of prejudice, fear, love and the struggle for freedom, this novel is thoroughly re-searched and historically correct.

Perry, Anne. "Ashworth Hall" (Fawcett Columbine, 1997). This is a magnificent addition to

Perry's much loved series featuring Thomas and Charlotte Pitt. It is inspired by the majestic march of history in the age of Queen Victoria.

Price, Eugenea. "The Waiting Time" (Doubleday, 1997).

Spirited Abigail Banes dreams her newly married life in coastal Georgia will be lived amid spreading trees, where lovers walk and whisper along blossom lined paths. But her dreams are shattered when a fatal accident claims her husband, Eli, leaving her sole proprietor of the rich plantation and the slaves that work the magnificent land.

Puzio, Mario. "The Fortunate Pilgrim" (Random House, 1997).

This is a novel of the loves, crimes, and struggles in the family of one unforgettable woman who traveled 3,000 miles of dark ocean from the mountainous farms of Italy to the streets of New York,
