
Mauney Library offers Web TV

Web TV has come to Mauney Memorial Library, and it's free to the public.

Just point and click, and you can go anywhere - with hundreds of documents, pictures, and information resources at your fingertips.

One of our patrons very generously donated a television and a Web TV to the library so the public can have access to the World Wide Web. In the near future, we will be getting a printer so information can be printed from the Web.

Web TV is the newest innovation to bring television and computers together, and to make the World Wide Web more accessible to the general public. It is quick and easy. It is much simpler to surf the Internet on Web TV than on the computer. A booklet with clear and concise instructions takes you through the necessary steps



to locate and access information. A directory is included with e-mail addresses.

The World Wide Web is truly a collection of documents and information resources from all over the world. You can travel from Germany to Japan at the click of a button. There are medical resources for people seeking information about a particular problem. You can go back in time to the Civil War, World War I and II, and view the actual battle maps, see what the men thought and felt during

that period of their lives, and share to some extent in the experience. There are an abundance of educational sites for children of all ages as well as adults. These sites cover the sciences, social studies, math, literature, etc.

A few simple rules will govern the use of the Web TV.

Children under 12 years of age must be accompanied by an adult.

Persons must sign in at the circulation desk and check out the keyboard, remote control, and the information books.

■ Patrons will be limited to two-hour sessions.

■ When the patron is finished using the Web TV, he must return the keyboard, remote control, and information books to the circulation desk and check out.
