## **Grover printing operations** breaks ground Thursday

Grover Printing Operations, a packaging design and manufacturing company, broke ground Thursday afternoon for a \$5 million production plant in

The 53,000 square foot facility is slated to open April 1998. The plant will employ 100 people, 80 percent to be hired locally and trained at Cleveland Community College.

Mike Panveno, general manager, said AGI Incorporated has been in business 25 years in Southern Illinois and plans to

be a "good corporate neighbor."
"We're excited," said Penpino
as he helped Richard Block, master of ceremonies, and other officials distribute gold T-shirts with the company logo. Block introduced a team of AGI runners who demonstrated in a relay race how the company had been built on speed "to go far beyond expectations."

Block said the relay race symbolized the speed of their operation and how quickly it can get orders and turn them around.

Block said one of the main reasons the firm chose Grover was because it was close to one of its major clients, Polygram Distributing. The move will speed up the turnaround time in printing information and provide it to Polygram.

The new plant will produce standard music packaging -such as printed paper compo-nents for insertion into CD packages and audio cassettes.

Based in Melrose Park, ILL., AGI produces packaging for clients that include Polygram Records, Sony Music Entertainment and IBM. The company's first customer in 1969 was Mercury Records.

Block said the company is "glad to be in North Carolina."

# Police patroling Moss Lake

Rep. John Weatherly said he has been assured by the N. C. Wildlife Commission and the City of Kings Mountain that law enforcement is evident and active at city-owned Moss Lake.

Weatherly, who lives on Moss Lake, sought the report, he said, because of statements made to him that Moss Lake "does not have sufficient law enforcement."

"The Commission reported that three wildlife officers who work the lake with the primary officer being Kenneth Cook who patrols Moss Lake," said Weatherly.

Since March 1, 1997 the offi-cers reported spending 575 hours patrolling the lake with 100 arrests and numerous warnings ranging from boating safety equipment to fishing without

Weatherly said the officers reported the lake has light activity during the week with more activity on Saturday and the peak activity on holidays and Sunday afternoons.

The Wildlife Commission is


charged with enforcing boating safety regulations as well as enforcing fishing and hunting reg-
