jects 29 years ago but that he bought the facility in 1993 and upgraded the apartments which rent for \$315 to \$475 per month.

Robinson pointed out that the apartments are within the city's extra territorial jurisdiction and at the time that Hutchins purchased the apartments he had understood it was zoned for multi-family dwellings. Hutchins said he had never been advised by the city of a change in zoning what occurred when the city annexed the area.

Hutchins said that 45 of the 50 apartments have been renovated and airconditioned and at some time in future years he might expand if there is need for more housing.
