when 11-year-old Dustin Ruppe of Kings Mountain is in the

Ruppe, a fifth grade student at Bethware School, got hooked on the hunting bug last year and killed his limit of 10 deer at his father Tony's farm in Winnsboro, SC.

This deer season, Dustin scored another perfect 10, and he also bagged his first wild

He kills also again placed him high in big deer contests in South Carolina.

Dustin won first place with pounds.

A deer doesn't stand a chance the biggest doe, and first place with the biggest buck in the youth division (15-years old

> But, because of his success in his first year of hunting last year, his father also entered him in some adult contests and he placed high there too, with first place in biggest doe, fifth in biggest buck, and third in widest rack. He won two trophies and \$302 in the adult divi-

His biggest buck this year was a 159-pound, 8-pointer with a 17-inch spread.

Now that he's conquered South Carolina, Dustin has his sights set on even bigger deer.

'I go on a hunt to South Texas every year," said his fa-ther, "and he's been wanting to go down there with me. I've been waiting until I thought he was old enough to go, so this year he's going to go with me to South Texas for a deer hunt in December."

Hopefully, Dustin says, he will get some deer down there big enough to place him high enough in the Boone Crockett scoring system to have his name printed in a book which includes the biggest kills of the

The fate of Grover's former 1954 firetruck came up. It was reported to be parked in a field and deteriorating. Mayor Rollins estimated a complete restoration would cost \$15,000. The council agreed to check into bringing the firetruck back to Grover and covering it up until a use for it could be decided up-
