Kings Mountain scored four runs in the third inning and held on for a 8-5 victory over Crest in Tri-County Middle School Conference baseball action Monday.

The Patriots, 2-0, collected eight hits and also took advantage of three Crest errors and two hit batsmen. Crest reached three KM pitchers for seven hits and also took advantage of four bases on balls and numerous wild pitches and passed balls.

Matt Echols and Caleb Williams led the KM hitting with two hits each. Ross Ellis, Tyler Allen, Warren Shirey and Elan Philbeck had one each.

Ellis started on the mound and worked 21/3 innings, but ran into control problems. Hunter Gaffney pitched 2 2/3 innings in relief to get the win, and Elan Philbeck pitched the final two innings to get a save.

Kings Mountain grabbed a 1-0 lead in the first on hits by Ellis, Echols and Williams, and a squeeze bunt by Buddy Black; but Crest came back to tie it in

the second without the benefit of a hit. A walk, wild pitches and passed balls did the damage.


In the second, Crest scored again on a walk and three passed balls, and at the end of two innings led 2-1 without having a hit.
