Feeder calf sale set at Shelby Livestock

N.C. Cooperative Extension is working with the N.C. Department of Agriculture and Shelby Livestock Yard in hosting a State Graded Feeder Calf sale on April 1.

Graded sales, which sort and group cattle based on sex, weight, breed, frame score, and degree of muscling often create added interest among cattle buyers and help producers earn added profits on sale day.

All cattle consigned to the sale must come directly from the farm (no mingled cattle must have been on the farm for a minimum of 45 days prior to the sale). Only steers and heifers of predominantly beef breeding and weighing at least 300 pounds will be accepted for sale.

A per head sales fee of \$3.50 plus 1.5% of sales price plus \$1 NCA Beef Checkoff, NCDA grading fee, insurance and yardage will be charged. All animals entering the sale must be sold. The consigner will not have a "no sale" privilege.

All cattle are to be delivered to the Shelby Livestock Yard in Shelby on April 1 between 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. Cattle must be on the market grounds by 4 p.m.
