



The Kings Mountain District Schools Board of Education is seeking parent and community input in the development of their 2001-2002 school year calendar. Anyone who wishes to offer suggestions or comments may do so by calling Ronnie Wilson at 734-5637 ext. 117 or writing to him at 105 East Ridge Street. It is anticipated that the Board will adopt a calendar at their March meeting.

The design of the calendar is directed to a large degree by North Carolina General Statues and State Board of Education policies. With those directives the 220-day calendar contains 180 student days, 11 holidays, 10 annual leave days, eight workdays designated by the Board, and 11 workdays desiga time determined by the Board. August 1, 2, 3 - Mandatory workdays.

August 6 - First day for students.

Sept. 3 - Labor Day holiday. Oct. 8 - End of first 9 weeks. Oct. 12 - Mandatory workday for Elementary-Discretionary for Middle/High.
