

KM students earn scholarships

Third Place was awarded to Susan Carlisle Bell for "The Trees Clap Their Hands".

Also, the Cleveland County Arts Council is accepting applications for the 2000-2001 Regional Arts Grant Scholarship Program. The deadline for applications is Tuesday, August 1. The Regional Artist Project Grants Program provides financial support for committed, accomplished artists seeking to advance their careers as professionals. Artists must be a resident of either Anson, Cabarrus, Cleveland, Gaston, Iredell, Lincoln, Mecklenburg, Rowan, Rutherford, Stanly, Union, or York counties since July 1, 1999. They must apply in the county where they reside. Funds are not available for projects already completed. Students are ineligible for these grants.

The Regional Artist Project Grants Program is supported by a grant form the N.C. Arts Council, a state agency, and funds are provided by participating arts councils.
