

# Computer courses at Cleveland Community College

Cleveland Community College has scheduled the following computer courses for the spring semester.

Web page design, Wednesdays from 6-9 p.m. January 17-April 11. The course will provide the basics needed to design a web page. Registration is \$60.

Computer basics, Mondays 6-9 p.m. January 22-April 9. The course will cover basic windows, word processing, and spreadsheet applications, and introduction to 3mail and the Internet. Registration is \$60.

Computer basics II, Tuesdays 6-9 p.m. January 16-April 10. This course will build on the fundamentals of computer basics and is recommended for students who have already completed computer basics or who are familiar with basic computer functions. Registration is \$60.

Excel, Thursdays 6-9 p.m. January 18-April 12. The course introduces basic spreadsheet design and development utilizing Microsoft Excel software. Students learn the basics of

writing formulas, using functions and creating charts. Registration is \$60.

Computer aided drafting II, Thursdays 6-9 p.m. January 18-March 1. The course builds on the fundamentals of CAD 2000 software and is recommended for students who have completed Auto Cad 2000 Level I. Registration is \$55.

Computer basics for seniors, Fridays 12-3 p.m. January 19-April 13. Learn the basics of personal computer use. The course covers basic windows, word processing, and spread-

sheet applications, and instruction in email and the Internet. Registration fee is \$40.

Internet basics, 6-9 p.m. Wednesdays January 17-April 11. The course will introduce students to the basics of searching for information on the Internet, email, and an introduction to web page design. Registration is \$60.

Keyboarding, Thursdays 6-9 p.m. January 18-April 12. The course covers keyboarding and basic computer operations with an introduction to Microsoft Word. Registration is \$60.

Powerpoint, Thursdays 9 a.m.-12 noon January 19-April 13. Learn to produce professional presentations for business or personal use utilizing MS Powerpoint software. Registration is \$60.

Quick Books Pro 2000, Tuesdays 6-9 p.m. January 16-April 10. Registration is \$60. All courses are held on the campus of CCC. Classes are offered on a first come, first serve basis. Call 484-4015 to have a registration form mailed, or register in person in the Continuing Education Office on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9 a.m.-7 p.m. at least one week prior to the beginning date of the class. Students must be 18 years of age or older. Those 65 years of age or older are fee exempt from most classes.
