## Three wins keep Patriots undefeated

Kings Mountain Middle School's baseball team clinched at least a tie for the Tri-County Conference championship last week by winning three games to run their record to 11-0.

Monty Deaton's Patriots defeated Shelby 16-3, Burns 14-2 and Lincolnton 12-1. All three games were called after


