Kings Mountain High's women's volleyball team opened defense of its State 3A championship Tuesday night with a 15-8, 15-10, 15-3 victory over East Gaston at Donald L. Parker Gymnasium.

The Lady Mountaineers advance to a second round game tonight at 6 o'clock at R-S Central, a team they defeated twice during the regular season. Kings Mountain, which finished second to Fred T. Foard in the Southwestern Foothills 3A, carries a 20-3 overall record into the match.

R-S Central, which finished third in the SWFH, advanced with a victory over Mountain Athletic Conference champion North Buncombe.

The winner of tonight's game will advance to a third round game Saturday. The likely opponent is Fred T. Foard. The Western Regionals Championship game is next Tuesday.



# **Indians** here Friday for home finale

The Southwestern Foothills Conference #4 playoff seed will likely be on the line Friday when Kings Mountain's Mountaineers host St. Stephens in their final home game.

The game has been designated as Senior Night. All senior players and their parents will be recognized.

The Mountaineers carry a 2-2 conference and 2-6 overall mark into the game while St. Stephens comes in at 2-2 and 3-6. They are tied for fourth place behind unbeaten Burns and Crest (both 3-0) and Hickory (2-1).

On paper, the Mountaineers are favored but as Coach Dave Farquharson's charges found out last year in Hickory, games aren't won on paper. The underdog Indians took advantage of five turnovers and numerous mental mistakes by the Mounties to post a 20-13 upset.

Coach John Jarman lost most of the players off that team, including SWFH player of the year Thomas Gordon at fullback. But one of the few starters that returned, quarterback Shane Matthews, is one of the best all-around athletes in the conference. He threw for over 1,000 yards last year and has been consistently over 100 yards per game this year.
