Within an hour the suspect was caught, but in the meantime officers had been told that there might be a third suspect on the loose.

By early afternoon officers determined that was not the case, but instead of pulling their officers away from the schools they remained the rest of the day and escorted children and employees to their buses and cars.

Cash said officers actually patrolled the halls of the school, and others were stationed outside to make sure no one came on school grounds.

"When we called it off we felt like the children were pretty much traumatized and it wouldn't be a good emotional time to just leave," he said. "For that reason we turned the school back over to the principal but we kept our deputies there until all students and staff left campus. But we never thought there was any danger. We had the school surrounded and the suspect was running in the other direction.'

Since there was mention of a third suspect - and police received a report of a man walking US 74 near Dennis #3, which is located just over the US 74 Bypass from the Bethware community - Chief Proctor also ordered a lockdown at KMHS, KMMS, KMIS and West Florest term

He said he was "tickled to death" at how well the plan worked, but he did see a couple of things that the safety committee will have to address, most notably the use of cell phones by students at KM High.

"It's the one thing that really stuck out as a problem," he said. "That's something we'd like to go back and re-address. Kids were calling their parents and telling them a shooting had occurred at school, and other crazy stuff that was nowhere near the truth."

Proctor said a State team had come in to evaluate the local plan, and he was surprised to find that the county was ahead of what others in the State were planning.

"It was the first test to see how well it would go, and I was extremely pleased," he said.

Proctor said for the most part, law enforcement, school officials, students and parents should be commended "We had a few parents

trying to come and pick up kids, but they realized that once this plan is initiated you can't do that," he said. "They worked well with us. I was real pleased, because it is a major coordinating effort. I was thoroughly impressed."
