Lenora opened her program by showing a large poster of the most common birds in North Carolina. She stated that birds are "feathered friends who pollinate flowers and reduce the bug population." During the winter, one should make birds a gardening focal

point. They offer beauty and life to the yard. Their songs can brighten a gray, blustery

As temperatures drop, natural food supplies become scarce and birds must scratch the leaf littered ground in search of seeds and insects. Humans can help them by supplying food and water.

There are many different types of seeds. Suet cakes, dried fruits, peanuts and mealworms may provide a variety in their diet. Sunflower seeds attract many species of birds.

Hang bird feeders at least

five feet off the ground and 10 feet away from trees and shrubs or fences. This will help keep squirrels and cats away. Birds need protection from the elements. Thick, bushy evergreens that block rain and wind will help.

Bird houses should be in place by the middle of February. Most birds start looking for a nesting place by then.

Bluebirds need to be encouraged back to yards, because so many of their habitats have been destroyed. Lenora showed a blue bird house with a 1

1/2-inch hole.

Timely tips were given by Phyllis Carpenter. It is time to order seeds. Anyone planting a new camellia bush should find an area that is sheltered from the sun and wind. Start a garden journal.

There will be a Garden Club Day at the Southern Spring Show on February 25. A special luncheon will be served at noon.






