Clive Haynes' work on display at CCC

The gallery at Cleveland Community College is currently hosting "The Art of Mural Painting," a show featuring the works of Rutherfordton artist Clive Haynes. The exhibit runs through May 31.

Haynes lived in England for over 20 years, operating his own business: Clive's Gardening and Home Maintenance. He and his wife, Dianne, lived in England for the first 10 years of their marriage.

After trying his hand at landscaping, Haynes decided on a career as a cobbler, mending shoes at his shop in Rutherfordton. During his spare time, Haynes painted a mine with tunnel and carts on the walls of his shop, complete with railroad tracks on the floor. "It was quiet in the shop and I had to do something. I stood here and I looked at it and I thought, 'that wall would look nice with a picture on it."

Although he no longer works in shoe

repair, Haynes paints murals and acrylic landscapes, is a musician, a song writer, and author of children's stories. His murals can be seen in Forest City, Rutherfordton, Chimney Rock, and Kings Mountain.

Haynes cleverly disguises actual objects within his murals. One mural includes a vent as a rabbit hole, while another vent simulates steam coming from a train.

The exhibit at Cleveland Community College demonstrates the process of formulating creative ideas as a mural is developed. It displays artist's studies and pictures of the finished product.

The exhibit is free and open to the public during regular college hours, 8 a.m.-10 p.m., Monday through Thursday, and from 8 a.m.-4 p.m. on Fridays.


