Singing on the mountain slated

Sunday, June 22 marks the 79th year of "Singing on the Mountain," the oldest, ongoing gospel convention in the southern Appalachians.

Founded in 1924 as the Hartley family reunion, the singing is an authentic mix of camp meeting, family reunion, dinner on the grounds and church bazaar.

The singing is a free, day-

long gathering held out-of-doors in a meadow at the base of the 6,000-foot Grandfather Mountain. Music begins at 8:30 a.m. and continues throughout the day with a break at 1 p.m. for the sermon. Many families bring lawn chairs and picnics and make a day of seeing old friends and enjoying performances by top southern gospel groups.

Dr. Michael Whitson, pastor of First Baptist Church in Indian Trail, is the featured speaker for the 79th singing. A frequent speaker at many southern gospel gatherings, Whitson is a Kenan Speaker in the Southern Baptist Convention. He proclaims the message that Christ is a life-changer. In October over 1,000 people responded by giving their hearts to Jesus when he spoke at the Christian's Alternative to Halloween in Winston-Salem.

The Greenses will again serve as host for the event. Familiar to gospel audiences for hits like "Some Sweet Day," "In The Morning Light," and "Glorious City of God," the Greenses have headed up the musical portion of the program at the singing for more than a decade.

Other featured performers include George Hamilton IV of the Grand Ole Opry, The Primitive, Michael Combs, the Cockman Family, the Beene Family, the Comptons, Soul Purpose, Joyful Hearts, the Dowden Sisters, Safe Harbor, the Bumbough Family and Southern Accent.
