quickly spot a forged prescription.

Blanton said choosing pharmacy as a career was easy. As a youngster, his father owned what was then Rexall of Kings Mountain.

"He was anxiously awaiting me to finish school," Blanton said.

Eventually Blanton sold the pharmacy. It was later bought by Revco and then CVS. Until retiring, Blanton worked for Eckerd. Today he works part-time at Mountain Street Pharmacy, filling in for Allan Propst, one of the owners.

'He's a good pharmacist," Blanton said.

Despite the changes in his profession, patient confidentiality remains a priority for pharmacists, Blanton said.

"Pharmacy has always been strong in that area, like doctors and lawyers," Blanton

Pressley gives much of the credit to the local Young Democrats organization based out of Gardner Webb University.


"It was the younger people who got this award for me," he said.

Pressley first got interested in politics in 1998. He made a bid for an at-large Kings Mountain city council seat in 1999 but was defeated by Gene White.


Despite the loss, Pressley says he benefited from the race, learning a lot about the political process. Today he is enjoying working behind the scenes.


