Oak View's youth and associate pastor Jeff Neelands, Freeman and several of the church's youth saw Freeman preach at the Big God Youth Conference in Myrtle Beach over the

New Year's holiday. Caldwell said around 200 youth made decisions for Christ.

The church approached Freeman about coming to Kings Mountain. His schedule usually fills up a year in advance Caldwell said, though he had the February opening.


"We feel like the Lord's in it," Caldwell said. "Our town needs revival, our nation needs revival."

Freeman is the author of "Rescued by the Cross.' According to a press release, he grew up in a fatherless household. During his youth, Freeman had nine different stepfathers and attended 24 schools. The troubled teen lived in the streets until accepting Christ at age 16. He joined a traveling music ministry at age 19 and became a full time minister of youth and music at age 22.
