The decision to reimburse Goforth for the cash came under fire from City Councilman Jerry Mullinax who said the State Bureau of Investigation should investi-

Goforth called the situation " a political game."

"If people of power of this city would spend more time looking after the well being of the city instead of individual department heads and department personnel. Some folks can't leave well enough alone. They've got to keep messing with us," Goforth said.

Mullinax denies his questions are politically motivat-

"I can see no way it can be political, a theft or a loss is a theft or loss. It cannot be political," he said.

Mullinax stands behind his request for an SBI inquiry.

We would have a clear and better understanding of what happened. At this point we don't know if anyone is guilty," he said.

Mullinax said he cannot ask for the SBI investigation himself but plans to ask District Attorney Bill Young to do so. Young could not be reached for comment.

While Goforth would not name names, he did say he had some "hunches" as to who or whom was behind the issue.

"I would like to see the citizens of Kings Mountain do more homework, dig in the backgrounds of who

they elect to lead their city,"

Since the reimbursement was made public, Goforth said he had received several phone calls. During a recent weekend fishing trip to South Carolina, he saw someone from Kings Mountain who had read about the issue.

"I've got to where I hate to walk in anywhere. I want to put this situation behind me. I'm tired of the newspapers and all this publicity," Goforth said. "It seems to me I'm getting jumped on and rode hard and I shouldn't be. You don't know what I've been through."

Goforth said it was his idea to reimburse the city even though he believes the initial decision to reimburse him was correct.

"Whoever is wanting to stir things up can live with this money. I can live without it," Goforth said. "I don't feel what I'm doing is the right thing but it is worth every penny to write this check and get rid of this problem or hopefully get rid

Hicks said he called the press conference at Goforth's request.

"I don't have any comments at all. This is his meeting," Hicks said.

City public relations director Ellis Noell and Proctor sat in on the press conference also. Neither had any comments.

Goforth has worked for the police department for 10 years, sometimes on Moss Lake and also during city events.
