tions. At his shop, Baity and one other mechanic have been certified to use the computerized device which scans the vehicle's motor for compliance.

Baity says the new standards are a daily topic of conversation. Customer reactions vary from skeptical inspections. to confused.

"They don't seem to look forward to it," he said.

One person was relieved his inspection was due in June, giving him one more year before having to meet the emission's requirements. Baity supports the new

"We've got this pollution problem. We've got to do something about it," he said.

Regular tune ups, oil changes and proper tire inflation can result in both compliance with the rules and better gas mileage, according to Baity.

"It's small, common sense

stuff. When the check engine light comes on, don't continue to drive," he said.

The new inspection will take between 20 and 30 minutes. Baity is planning to convert one bay into a waiting area and has added an additional bay to conduct

The emissions and safety inspections cost a combined \$30 for vehicles manufactured after 1995. Older vehicles are only required to have the \$9.10 safety inspections which checks the horn, brakes, tires, lights, wipers and power steering fluid. Inspection prices are mandated by the state.

Inspections are due in the month indicated on the sticker. Vehicles which fail have 30 days to correct the

Diamond Chevrolet, Plonk Tire and Wade Ford are also offering the emissions inspection.

Kings Mountain International announced Tuesday that it will occupy the former Encompass/ABB Combustion building.

The company expects a capital investment of \$5 million and estimates generating 100 new positions within the next few years, according to a press release from the Cleveland County Chamber.

"We're excited they're opening in our community," said Kings Mountain Mayor Rick Murphrey.

Murphrey credited the city's competitive utility rates, property tax, skilled workforce and easy access to Interstate 85 for attracting industry.

He also said the mild climate is attractive to businesses from the northeast. KMI will begin operations

at the facility in October, according to the press release. The Employment Security Commission has hiring information.

The company provides metal processing services to a variety of industrial applications, according to the press release.

Tim Moore's gun bill passes NC House

The North Carolina House of Representatives adopted a bill Tuesday which would make it a felony to fire a gun inside a school.

Cleveland County Representatives Tim Moore and Debbie Clary sponsored the bill.

It was introduced after a student fired shots inside Burns Middle School in September. The court was only able to penalize the youth for carrying a gun on school property. The judge ruled that a law against firing into an occupied build-

ing did not apply because the student was not firing from outside the building.

"This new law will make our schools safer," Moore wrote in a press release.

The bill passed 106 to 8. Moore said Wednesday

morning that he was surprised anyone voted against it. The bill excludes from prosecution firing a weapon in self defense or in defense of someone else.

The bill is now pending in the Senate.
