■ Children ages 6 months-18 years on chronic aspirin therapy.

■ Health-care workers involved in direct patient care. Out of home caregivers and household contacts of children ages less than six months.

Persons who are unable to stand in line should take someone to stand in line for them, and health care workers will go to the car to give them their vaccine.
