

Lyndsey Murphey jumps 1,400 times in AHA fund raiser

Bethware Elementary fourth grader Lyndsey Murphey jumped rope 1,400 times in 25 minutes to beat a school record.

Lyndsey out-did last year's champ by 300 jumps. The competition wasn't just about beating records. It was an American Heart Association fund raiser. Students collected pledges for the amount of jumps they made. Lyndsey raised \$110.

Chase Hullender, also a fourth grader, finished second in the number of jumps - 1,356. He raised \$155.

Third grader Michele Bridges brought in the most money - \$232. That's the most any student has raised. The school raised a total of \$3,300.

All three students are on the Bethware jump rope team. Approximately 35 students each are on the two teams. Second and some third graders make up the gold team and fourth and some third graders comprise the black team.
