Noell washes golf carts and golf balls, picks balls up from the driving range and and performs an assortment of other tasks.

"I love it here. This is fun," the teen said.

Noell says his job makes him the envy of his friends. While Noell found a job which even comes with free golf and "friendly bosses," many teens are working in fast food, retail and construction.

Heather Walker who graduated with Noell believes networking is the way to find a job. Recently one of her friends got a job through the young woman's future sister-in-law.

"She's got connections," Walker said.

Walker has struggled to find a job this summer. Employers are reluctant to hire someone who is leaving for college in a few months, she said.

Her lack of formal experience hurts too. While Walker has worked with her dad, a Fed Ex driver, during Christmas and summer break and cleaned, pressurewashed and mowed at her grandparents' mobile home park, that isn't enough for would-be employers, she has found.

"I wish they would just let me show them my progress report," Walker said. "It doesn't work that way."

At least Walker is not alone. Another one of her



Cansler Street. According to officials, Fannin had heard a rumor that a muffler shop










The Pop Warner coaches will be soliciting businesses in the community during the next several weeks to ask for help with youngsters' registration fees.

In the past the club has charged a \$50 registration fee, but recognizes that the large fee causes many youngsters not to be able to participate.

The club has sponsored four teams in the past, but beginning this year can sponsor up to six if enough players come out.

According to Jeff Putnam, longtime Pop Warner coach, it costs about \$250 to outfit a player. The teams have a lot of usable equipment left over from last year; however, each year equipment has to be repaired and updated.

Including up to six football and cheerleading teams, approximately 300 youngsters could participate, Putnam said.

The Kings Mountain teams use game receipts and special fund raisers to provide the majority of the funds needed to finance the football program.
