LOCAL

Three to four former textile plants burn every year in the South, according to Hensley. The longer a building stays unoccupied, the more of a danger it becomes. These buildings typically don't have sprinkler systems. One major fire wall helped contain the damage at Minnette.

Portions of the mill were over a century old, making entry dangerous for firefighters. They used an aerial device similar to a tree trimming truck bucket to attack the fire from above. Few firefighters were sent into the building.

"It's a lot safer, plus it puts out a lot more water," Hensley said.

Firefighters used an estimated 600,000 gallons of water on the fire and 4,000 feet of fire hose. Hensley credited trained firefighters and good equipment to controlling the blaze.

"'What if' came true and we were ready," he said. "It's all about training."

Hensley advises people living near unused mills to keep an eye on structures -and report any suspicious people on the property. The high number of access areas make it hard to keep people out of the structures, he

A member of Grover Rescue Squad spotted smoke and reported the fire at 3:04 a.m. The fire also woke several neighbors around that time.

Firefighters from Grover, Kings Mountain, Bethlehem, Number 3, Oak Grove, Antioch, Shelby, Cleveland County and

Blacksburg responded.
The mill is owned by Clyde Huffman. He could not be reached by press deadline. No monetary damage estimate has been made yet.

because a neighbor's pool was not completely fenced. Last month the neighbor completed fencing and installed a gate, according to Humphries.

Tuesday Humphries said she was glad the council was taking action, calling it "a long time coming."

According to Putnam, the offending pools would be located by both a search on behalf of the codes department and resident reports. That information also is available on tax records, according to Jean Mayes of the Cleveland County Tax Assessors Office.
