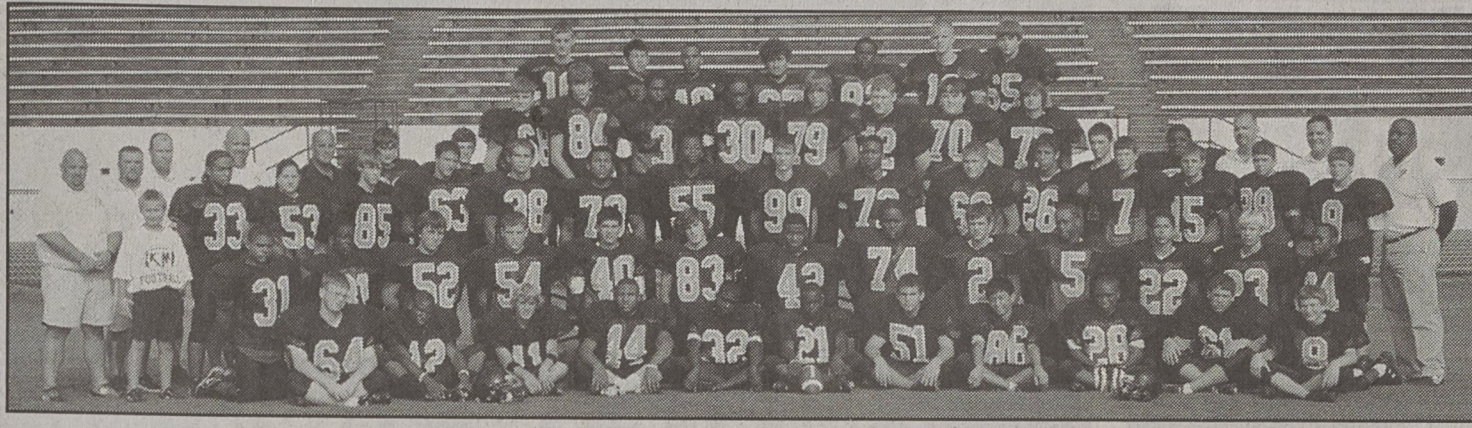

misses, however, noting that teams don't usually spend a lot of time working on two-point conversions for a scrimmage. But he does feel like the Mountaineers will have to play much better in the regular season.

"I thought we executed well but I think we had some things we need to improve on," he said. "We fumbled the ball on a long drive and messed up a snap. I'm not too concerned about the two-point conversion. That's something you don't plan on doing in a scrimmage. Overall, I thought they played well and got after it."

Kings Mountain's defense, which gave up 40 points per game last season, has worked hard to improve and showed it early. But as the game wore on Waddell got its offense going and erased an early 6-0 deficit to put up 14 unanswered points in the two-quarter game.

"Early-on, the defense really played well," Farquharson said. "As the scrimmage went along we continued to try to get some people some looks and move some people around to find out just how they were going to be able to contribute. We made some mistakes with some personnel, but that's what you hope to learn from in scrimmages."

Kings Mountain's offense showed flashes of brilliance. Sidney Goode and John Gwinn did a good job running and receiving and quarterback Brandon McClain was effective on short passing situations.

Farquharson said the Mountaineers will have to be able to control the ball to beat Hunter Huss, which has a talented quarterback in D.J. Knox and a host of good receivers. "It's going to be a good ball game," he said. "We're going to have to play well. We will have to execute well and sharpen up and do a better job offensively."

"I think Hunter Huss is well-balanced on both sides of the ball. They have good size on defense and they've got some speed and quickness on offense. We're going to have to play mistake-free football. We have to concentrate on the fundamentals and look to crate some turnovers and make some things happen, and we're going to have to control the football."

The Mountaineers lost four starters off last year's team, including Heffner, who was an All-State performer, and goalkeeper Stacey Spicer who came close to setting the state record for the most shutouts in a career. Both players, along with Emily Edwards, started for four years and Kara Fujita started three years.
