City, schools, businesses to close Monday

Kings Mountain City Hall will be closed Monday, Sept. 5 for Labor Day. There will be no garbage collection that day either. The regular schedule will be one day behind for the week of Sept. 5 to 9. Mauney Memorial Library will be closed Saturday, Sept. 3 and Monday Sept. 5. The Patrick Senior Center will be closed on Labor Day.

Cleveland County Schools and Cleveland County Offices will be closed Sept. 5.

Labor Day is a state holiday and a bank holiday.Post offices and other federal buildings will also be closed.

Labor Day is celebrated on the first Monday in September and is dedicated to the social and economic achievements of American workers, according to the US Department of Labor.

The First Labor Day was celebrated in 1882 in New York City, in accordance with the plans of the Central Labor Union. Oregon was the first state to officially celebrate Labor Day.

Cleveland County Red Cross disaster volunteers may be headed south to help in the wake of Hurricane Katrina.

As of Tuesday morning, five volunteers were on stand-by, according to Sandi Bolick, assistant director of the Cleveland County Red Cross.

The national office has not yet told the volunteers when or where they will be deployed. Shelters have been opened in Mississippi and Louisiana.

The local volunteers are part of the Cleveland County Chapter's disaster action team. The DAT team works locally to provide emergency housing and clothing assistance to victims of house fires and to set up shelters during storms and other

disasters.

however, before being deployed to a major disaster like the one in the Gulf Coast they must undergo local training and work on smaller disasters. Volunteers also are needed to help with safety/first aid classes, blood drives, clerical work and the Armed Force Emergency Services

> program. AFES volunteers are a liaison between military families and the armed forces. They notify soldiers of births, deaths and other family emergencies and help bring military personnel home. The activation of local National Guard units has increased their caseload and more volunteers are needed, Bolick said.

Volunteers are always needed,

Young people age 13 and up are welcome to volunteer in the Red Cross office with clerical functions, organizing supplies and notifying blood donors of upcoming blood mobiles.

The Red Cross will be collecting food and other items for Gulf Coast disaster victims. Drop-off points have not been established yet. Officials ask that the public not bring contributions to the Shelby nor Kings Mountain office due to lack of space.


Useful items include prepared canned foods like pork and beans, meats, fruit and vegetables with either a pull top opening or a manual can opener. Other good contributions are commercially bottled water, sugared powdered drink mixes in plastic bottles, diapers, unscented baby wipes, baby food, milk and baby bottles, napkins, paper plates and other paper items, personal care supplies like shampoo and soap, flashlights, batteries, plastic bags and duct tape.

The following items should not be sent: unmarked goods, perishables, carbonated drinks, glass containers and damaged supplies.

Kings Mountain's electric department is on stand-by. Director Nick Hendricks said crews closer to the storm ravaged area are being sent first.

Volunteers from the North Carolina Baptist Men were slated to arrive in Mississippi on Wednesday with feeding, recovery, shower, laundry and generator units. That teams also includes a chaplain and ham radio operator.


