## Girl Scouts see drop in cookie sales

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Area Girl Scouts are experiencing a decline in cookie sales, compared to sales levels recorded this time last year. The annual cookie sales drive, which typically begins with pre-orders in November, serves as the Girl Scouts' primary fund raiser.

Girl Scouts in the Western Piedmont region, which includes Polk, Cleveland, Rutherford, Lincoln and Gaston counties, amassed over \$80,000 last year selling 22,000 cases of cookies.

"A lot of it has to do with economics and people watching their wallets, but compared to where we are last year, our sales are down," said Gina Cali of the Piedmont Council.

However, there is some good news about

cookie sales. Kings Mountain Girl Scout Troop 155 has collected 214 boxes of cook-ies for the local National Guard unit stationed in Iraq.

Troop 155 is taking cookie orders for the United States National Guard 505th. Troop leader Lori Sutherland's sister-in-law, Kimberly Sutherland, is currently serving in the 505th.

"I do feel a personal connection with the unit my sister serves in," said troop leader Lori Sutherland.

Donations for the cookie fund are being collected at Hoey Memorial United Methodist Church, or can be made by contacting Lori Sutherland at 739-2292. The 505th is expected to continue its tour of duty in Iraq through September.

As for cookie sales among civilians, the Piedmont Council expects sales to improve

over the next two weeks. With one final push, the Scouts may even exceed last year's sales mark.

"Our program ends on March 14 and our goal is 24,310 cases for our five county area," said Cali.

Girl Scout troops nationwide are under the direction of local councils which cover a specific region. The Piedmont Council in Ĝastonia oversees troop activity in Kings Mountain and Cleveland County.
