# Nelson Roper was a real hero

On May 16 Kings Mountain lost an authentic "hero." Unknown to most citizens of Kings Mountain, Nelson Roper, one of the most highly decorated veterans to return home alive from Vietnam, quietly lived out his life in our city.

Like most true warriors he never mentioned his exploits in Vietnam, you couldn't pick the information out of him. He may have shared some of his experiences with Billie Jo, his wife and mother of his three sons, but if so, she took the knowledge with her when she passed away three years ago.

Nelson's helicopter was shot from the skies on two different occasions and he along with it. He survived to fight another day, but some of his crew didn't. On one occasion his helicopter flew directly into an intense firefight to rescue several wounded and stranded infantrymen who were about to be overrun by advancing North Vietnamese Regulars. Had it not been for Nelson and his crew, their names would be inscribed on the "wall;" instead, they celebrated Mother's Day at home with their mothers this past Sunday.

Following several months of rehabilitation in an army hospital in Japan, he came home with relatively minor scars after being awarded his first Purple Heart. Then he went back for a second tour and was assigned to the 1st Air Calvary Division. Soon he was in the thick of it again, only to be severely wounded again. But not before he had been awarded the Silver Star, Bronze Star, Distinguished Flying Cross, Air Medal with "V" device for valor, Vietnam Service Medal with "V" device and oak leaf cluster, Valorous Unit Award, Meritorious Unit Commendation, Republic of Vietnam Gallantry Cross with Palm, Unit Citation Badge, Vietnam Civil Actions Honor Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Vietnam Campaign Medal, Army Commendation Medal with two oak leaf clusters, and his second Purple

The term "hero" has been badly misused by sportswriters who use the word to describe achievements by an athlete on a football field or basketball court. How could anyone possibly compare the courageous efforts required by just one of the awards listed above to that of catching a pass in a football game? To do so is a mockery and is absolutely ridiculous.

Memorial Day will be observed shortly, and there is no better time to remind all of Kings Mountain that we have just lost a "real hero." One who deserves more than to be simply called a "hero," because Nelson was much more than that. I watched him grow from a little "cotton mill cowboy" to the larger than life man that he was. He was a wonderful husband, grandfather, and brother; he was, and will always be, my buddy.

He wasn't a "wannabe" or a rear echelon soldier, but a true patriot who saw his duty and performed that duty with honor. When he returned home after his second tour in the war zone, he was picked up at the Charlotte airport. On the way out of the terminal he commented "just look at all those people walking around as if nothing is happening." His thoughts were back in Vietnam with his buddies who were fighting for their lives - and your freedom.

Memorial Day would be a good time for the citizens of Kings Mountain to think about Nelson and the sacrifices he made for each of us. And to also remember the sacrifices currently being made by his son, who is serving as a Navy Corpsman on his third tour of duty in Iraq and the Middle East; and all the other "heroes" who, on a daily basis, lay their lives on the altar of freedom.

It is also a good time to reflect on the fact that "Freedom is not Free."

# No tax hike in Grover budget

eweaver@kingsmountainherald.com Grover Town Council Monday night voted to keep the tax rate the same in next year's budget.

The property tax rate was set to remain at 29 cents per \$100 assessed value. Water and sewer utility rates are set to remain at 9 cents/\$100 for a grand total of 38 cents/\$100. Last year the town's tax rate was listed as the third (out of the 12 towns and cities) highest in the county. But compared to other municipalities of the same size and population, it is still one of the cheapest places

Mayor Robert Sides said that he has worked hard on the proposed budget for the 2007-08 fiscal year over the past three weeks. He was happy to announce that the tax rate will not change on July 1. Councilwoman Jackie Bennett was also pleased to announce that rates for cemetery plots would also stay the same.

The conservative budget proposes cuts where needed and provides opportunities where possible. It allocates more money to the Community Improvement section of the General Fund, allowing more beautification projects within the town or the possibility of a 4th of July event.

## **Grover appoints** new police chief

Grover Town Council last week unanimously appointed Tommy Carroll of Kings

Mountain as police chief. He is presumed to begin by the end of this week. He has been a deputy in the Sheriff's office for the past seven and a half years and worked as a detention and relief officer at the jail for four and a half years.
