MEDITATION

Jesus' life lessons

When I was a ministerial student at Mars Hill College, one of my older mentors told me about the importance of building a

strong library. He laughed and said that one of his own mentors had jokingly said, "Be prepared to sell your bed to buy books." As the years have gone by, and the price of books has

risen, I have realized that it does seem as if you do have to sell your bed to buy books.

This is also why I have been selective in what I have bought, and I have spent most of my money on reference books that you don't typically sit down and read from cover to cover. But I also like to purchase titles that are fun and inspirational. I guess this is why I like Philip Gulley's books, because they tell fun, inspirational stories about common decency and good living. Gulley's latest title is Porch Talk,

and just yesterday I read his story of being obsessed with chairs, both as a collector and builder.

Having already talked about building a rocker himself, Gulley writes, "There is a certain transcendent joy in creating a thing of beauty. But even more fulfilling is to become a being of beau-This remark then leads Gulley to ponder what he describes as "the difference between thing and being - how we often confuse the two, reducing others to what they do, calculating their importance by what they own, not who they are." An example of this is when one man says of another, "He's worth a fortune." Sometimes remarks like that give the impression that we think a person's wealth, or lack thereof, has something to do with his or her

Now I think this is pretty important stuff, which is what makes Gulley's work inspiring. Yet, contemporary writers are not the only masters of the genre of the short, inspirational story. Telling short stories with important life lessons was actually one

of the familiar qualities of the ministry of Jesus Christ, and we have four gospels in the New Testament that report on the various stories Jesus told.

Three of the most well-known of Jesus, stories are found in Luke 15. There we read about three lost things - a lost sheep, a lost coin and a lost son. In each instance, when the lost things were found, there was great rejoicing that followed. The shepherd rejoiced as he came back home to the 99 with the lost sheep thrown over his shoulder, the woman threw a party for her neighbors when she found her lost coin, and the waiting father held a banquet in honor of the prodigal son, who had returned.

Jesus told these stories to remind us that God loves each of us so much that there is no limit to how far he will search and go in order to bring us home again. What better way could Jesus tell us of our worth than in stories like these?

The Kings Mountain Crisis Ministry has been helping needy families and people in the community with food, clothing, transportation and finances for the past 37 years and now they need your help.

"Our budget has been cut. We did not get as much this year from the United Way," said Mike Smith, of the Family Worship Center, a supporting church of the Crisis Ministry.

"We didn't get an increase and we got a decrease from what we received from last year," said Rebecca Lineberger, director of the Kings Mountain Crisis Ministry (KMCM). "At the present time, we're running at about \$4,000 in the red. So we're trying to gear up some things to take care of this deficit." She said that they also hope the benefit will make the public more aware of the need in the community and the help that they are there to provide.

A benefit for the Ministry will be held on Saturday, October 6 at 7 p.m. at the Family Worship Center, 1818 Shelby Road. KMCM is asking local churches to help perform at the benefit, either through choral, instrumental or dance routines.

"We want them to use their talents to bless the Crisis Ministry and to bless the community," Smith said. "It gives us a chance to come together as a community and to support the Crisis Ministry. That's one way we feel like a person could be supportive of the Crisis Ministry, is actually using their talents."
