NASCAR driver, team owner visits KM Rota

eweaver@kingsmountainherald.com A special treat was "flagged in" for Kings Mountain Rotarians at their Thursday meeting. NASCAR driver, Winston Cup Quest Motor Racing team owner and TV analyst with Fox Sports Net, Derrike Cope, presented a program of some of his memories on and off of the track.

Rotarian Jim Testa had invited him to speak and Cope gave due credit to Testa and Rotarian Carol Warner for helping him in his fast-paced pursuit to NASCAR fame. But his first dreams were not of the finish line.

As a young man, Cope aspired success as a professional baseball player. In high school, he was being scouted by the Chicago Cubs and the Baltimore Orioles. But his father insisted that he take the scholarship offered to him by Whitman College. In 1978, while he was playing catcher on his col-lege team, his dream was cut short. "He went to retrieve a wild pitch and when he turned to throw back to the base, his knee gave way," according to information released by Cope. "It turned out that the medial collateral and anterior cruciate ligaments were severed," as were his chances of a future in baseball.

"During his recovery, he helped his brother with his race car. Derrike's father was an engine builder for some of the best drivers in Winston West competition. This led Derrike to be interested in racing and after driving a few times, came up with the conclusion that racing would be his new career," according to www.derrikecope.com

Although, Cope has literally "hit the wall" a few times over the years, his determination and skill led him to two Rookies of the Year, 248 career Winston Cup

starts, and quite a few champi-onships. After starting at 71st place, he won the Daytona 500 in 1990. He also won the Budweiser 500 in Dover, Del., that same year.

In 2000, Cope formed his own team, Quest Motor Racing, with NHRA driver Warren Johnson. Testa and Warner provided financial backing and encouragement. "Warner and Testa did a lot for me," Cope said.

He told the Rotarians that they, like many teams, started with about five-seven employees and now have over 400.

The sport of stock car racing, which began with moonshine-hauling bootleggers trying to outrun the law during the prohibition era, has come a long way. There's no more "mountain dew" tucked in the floorboards, but Mountain Dew and alcoholic beverage companies do sponsor the racers. And the races, themselves, have been renamed, such as the Sprint Cup, which was once the Winston Cup and then,

the Nextel Cup.

Cope said that when Testa came on board they were racing with 600-horsepower engines.

Today's cars are propelled with 900-horsepower engines.

When asked how he feels about cup drivers racing in the nationwide series, he said that he likes it. "It's imperative to race against better people to become more proficient," he added. And about racing, "It's a great way to make a living, feed your family and enjoy your life."

The groom-elect is the grandson of Florence and the late Robert


