

All six students are looking at colleges after graduation, none said they would probably seek an elective office in their hometown, but all said they loved the political experience and the lessons learned at the week's short course in citizenship with hundreds of other youth their age.

This Chorus provides an opportunity for the very best singers from across the state to come together and work with a nationally acclaimed choral conductor.

Auditions were held in three regions across the state in which students auditioning must sing their voice part of the selected audition piece and also sight read music in a closed audition in front of a judge. Morgan sang highest soprano.

Over 1200 students in North Carolina auditioned but only 189 middle school students received this prestigious honor. Morgan traveled to Winston-Salem with Mrs. Sherry Young, KMMS Choral Director, for the NC Music Educators In-Service Conference where the Chorus rehearsed at the Benton Convention Center and then performed as a group in a concert on Sunday afternoon, Nov. 9, at the Stevens Center, the

performing arts facility of the North Carolina School of the Arts. The Chorus was conduced by Dr. Judith Bowers from Florida State University.

After performing in the chosen in Kings Mountain concert, Morgan received a scholarship to attend a clinic at Appalachian State University.


Tickets are available at all First National Bank offices. Advance tickets are \$20 each and \$25 each at the door. All net proceeds will be donated to a local charity.



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
