Megan Burns led the KM ladies with two wins in individual competition; and she also took part in a winning relay team. Burns won the 200 yard IM in 2:38.52 and the 100 yard butterfly in 1:12.88.

Burns, Emily Peeler, Ana Alpeter and Sarah Greenlee won the 200 yard freestyle relay in 2:02.61.

Greenlee won the 100 yard breast stroke in 1:21.73. Emily Peeler won the 200 yard free in 2:42.35.

Brooks McGinnis and Joe Gladden picked up first place finishes for the Kings Mountain men. McGinnis swam the 200 yard IM in 2:43.41 to defeat teammate Tanner Deaton, who finished in 2:58.41. Gladden won the 100 yard breast in 1:19.00.

Gladden, Deaton, Cline Tate and Hogan Sellers won the 200 yard free relay in 1:49.40. KM's Wayne Dover, Jared Boyd and Daniel Peterson finished second, and Dason Blanton, Ross Clark, Jefferey Falls and Dragos Dima of the Mountaineers were third.

Greenlee, Burns, Casey DeVane and Ana Alpeter finished second in the 200 yard medley relay, and Morgan Weeks, Marlin Lawrence, Carilyn Brauns and Amanda


Stacy were third.

won. We had a chance to really set ourselves up nice, but we let this one slip away. For us to have a chance to win the conference we now have to depend on some help from


