The second book in a fourvolume series, "Tracings: Schools and Schoolings" will soon be off the press for distribution and will feature the history of Kings Mountain and Shelby District Schools.

Retired educator Dean Westmoreland wrote the history of Kings Mountain Schools and is now taking orders at his residence, 704-937-7636. The book sells for

The first book in the planned series by Cleveland County Retired School Personnel, the history of Black schools in the county prior to the integration of schools, was a sell-out.

Westmoreland, a former Kings Mountain teacher, researched the school history several years and visited newspaper offices, school libraries, and state associations and talked at length to former educators and students at the various schools.

The book tells a number of interesting stories about schools in the Kings Mountain area and Grover and features personalities in those

Grover School is the oldest school in Cleveland County and began during or immediately after the Civil War era. The first school was a wooden structure located beside of First Baptist Church

Maldonia Livingston was Grover School principal for many years and was a strict disciplinarian. It was absolutely a 'no no' for a student to smoke. Dean's father, Bert Westmoreland, was one of Miss Livingston's students. "Dad told me that he got caught smoking and the principal made him dig a six foot deep hole but Dad thought he had the last laugh and got down in the hole and lit up a cigarette. Livingston caught him again and Dad dug a second hole." In later years Livingston also taught Dean Westmoreland as a third grader.

Livingston was the first certified principal in the state

of North Carolina. Said Dean, "There are a lot of stories in this book that will bring back many memories for students who attended any of the Kings Mountain District Schools, including the two-room schools.

Enter our Piedmont Peeps Show Diorama Contest!


