

Some fertilizer is needed and mulch can be added around the plants if planted in the yard. They can be purchased in different sizes. The roses are much easier to care for than regular roses.

Betty Alexander, who suggested that members plant

flowers that come back from seed for easy spring and summer color, gave timely tips. Violas, larkspurs, poppies and coneflowers seed themselves into the gravel and oil and pop up every spring. To reduce watering, grow plants that need little water and use rain barrels to collect water. Alexander stated that good hoses are required. Spend a little extra money up front so you will not spend your days untangling a kinked hose. Dogwood tree blossoms dress up the South with spring blooms, crimson fall color, and bright red leaves to transform energy from the

sun for next year's flowers. Leave them alone until their foliage turns yellow and begins to wither.
