Nine Kings Mountain firemen were recently state EMT certified following 203 hours of night and weekend classroom work during the past six months.

Fire Chief Frank Burns said that an 80% passing grade was required and firemen spent countless hours studying for the two hour long state test for North Carolina Emergency Medical Technician certification which included 32 modules, a skills test and written test.

Mayor Rick Murphrey presented EMT pens to the graduates at the recent city council meeting. They were: Jamie Black, Assistant Chief; Eric Carroll, Firefighter/Inspector; Engineers Willard Yarbrough, Louis Wilson, and Randy Peterson and volunteer firefighters Keith Dixon, Tyler Laughridge,

David Morrow and Derrick Wells. Rocky Pack and Bradley Gilliam completed the classroom work but have not taken the state test.

Kings Mountain firemen previously state EMT certified are Chief Frank Burns and firefighters Jimmy Hensley, Gary Burris and David Ayscue.

I haven't had much experience sitting around doing nothing. I don't know how good I'll be at that. I'm guessing not very good. After all,

how many reruns of Law & Order can a guy watch? And I don't knit and don't really have any desire to learn.

## Veteran with PTSD felt 'harassed'

## Letter to the Editor:

This Memorial Day, please remember the veterans who fought and died for this country. But also remember those who are being treated unjustly because of that service.

Last year, I was forced to retire because of a company's lack of enforcement of their personnel policies concerning the treatment of veterans. I don't want that to happen to another veteran.

I suffer from Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) but held down a good job with a North Carolina hospital for 16 years until I got a new supervisor who had not been in the military and knew nothing about the problems some veterans have. This man harassed me and made my job so difficult that I had no other choice but to retire. I think he would have soon found a way to fire me if I had not left on my own.

I am an electrician by trade and I am not trained to do some of the things that he told me to do, like tile work. He made comments about me to co-workers when I had to leave to go to the VA Hospital for my continuing therapy and medication.

I am a proud veteran. I can't help it that I have several service-connected disabilities and I am being treated badly because of my service to this great country. Things should not be this way.

I worked for 16 years for this same company and had no problems until this insensitive person was hired as my supervisor. I feel that I am being harassed because of my health problems and I have never been treated like this by anyone else.

To compound the problems, this situation at work and my subsequent retirement because of the harassment has put added pressure on my family. I love my family and I don't want to lose any of them - they're all I've got left.

My life has been spiraling

downward since this man became a part of it.


I realize there's probably nothing I can do about what has happened to me, but I did want other veterans to know my situation and, hopefully, be aware that there are people like this man who don't care about you, your service or your service-related illnesses.

Please, on this Memorial Day, make sure your company does proper training in PTSD so this terrible thing doesn't happen to another veteran.
