Select Shade Trees Now For Removal

Would you like to have more shade trees in your yard? Many of our native trees make excellent shade trees, according to R. S. Douglass, forestry specialist for the N. C. Agricultural Extension Service.
These trees can be removed without much difficulty in the winter months Douglass said. But now is the time to look around the woods and pick the kind of tree you want. Once the leaves have fallen, choosing a suitable yard tree is much more difficult.
"When picking a tree," Douglass cautioned, "remember that some species eventually become very large, while others never get tall. The design of your house should be considered," Douglass continued, "since the size of a tree can change the appearance of your house. And remember," he concluded, "don't set a tall-growing tree under utility wires."
