NORTH CAROLINA SLATES TOUGH BASEBALL FOES

RALEIGH—Four of the nation's top college baseball teams will meet North Carolina's "Big Four" teams in the first annual "intercollegiate baseball tournament" at Durham April 7-9.

The visiting teams will include Rollins, Ohio University, Yale and Notre Dame. They will meet North Carolina State, Duke, Wake Forest and North Carolina.

The tournament, said Willis Casey, assistant athletic director at North Carolina State, will be patterned after the highly successful Dixie Classic basketball tournament here. Casey will be the tournament manager.

SOUTH CAROLINA'S GRID SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED

COLUMBIA, S. C.—South Carolina will have 18 letter men around whom to build a football squad that will play a nine-game schedule this fall.

Army, West Virginia and The Citadel are dropped from the 1954 listings. Navy and Wofford are added to the card that lists five games away and four at home.

The home games will be Wofford, Furman, Clemson and Duke.

South Carolina had a 6-4 record the past season, and will go up against its 1955 opponents with a squad built around co-captains Hugh Bell, center, and Halfback Carl Brazell.

Other lettermen returning include two quarterbacks, two halfbacks, two fullbacks, one tackle, four guards and five ends.

The schedule announced by Athletic Director and Coach Rex Enright:

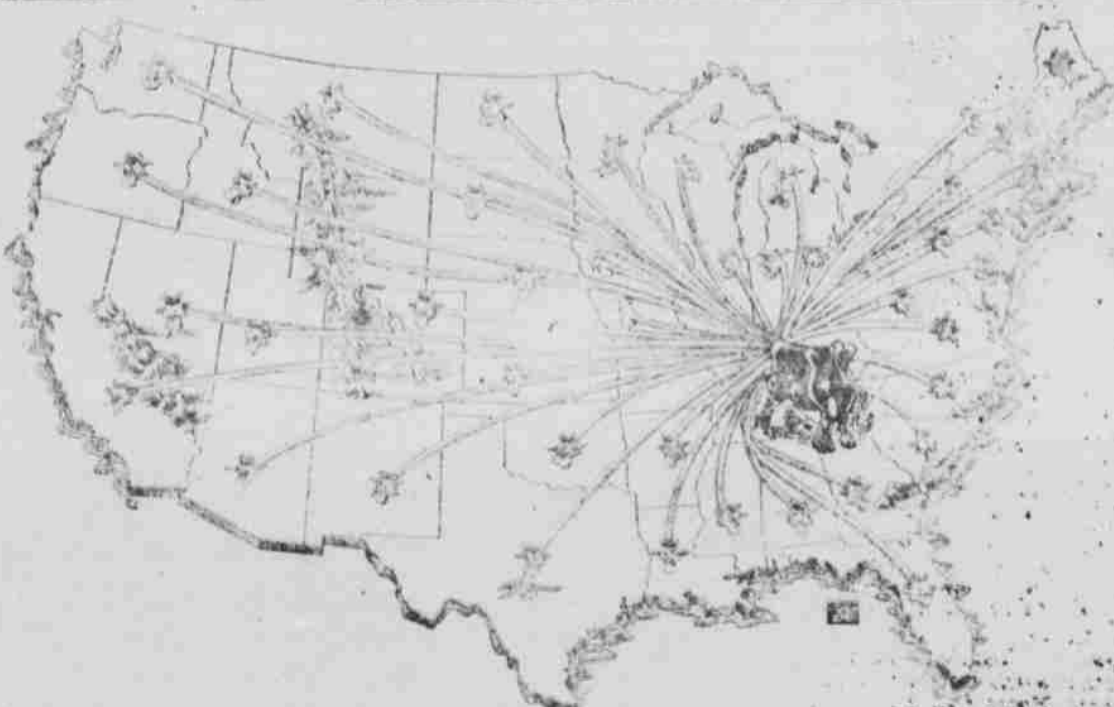
