To the south of her lie the flourishing tobacco fields of South Robeson and the cotton and tobacco plantations of the bordering South Carolina counties, Marlborough and Marion, while to the north famous tobacco and cotton farms of Old Robeson send their yearly

ton business and draws trade from an unusually large radius of territory. Fairmont is not an old town, indeed it has just very recently struck its stride, and the impetus given it by the tremendous amounts expended here each year and by the coming of the Beaufort County Lumber Co. which practically doubled its population seem to point to a healthy prosperous

name is due to the efforts of Mr. F. L. Blue who was mayor at that time. Mr. Blue realized the name of Ashpole had the psychological effect of suggesting to one a low swamp country so he set out to find a name that would be suitable to the town's location. In looking through the records Mr. Blue found where Fairmont in Davidson county had discontinued as a postoffice. He then directed the town's attorney to have the Charter amended and the town's name changed to Fairmont. The old town of Ashpole was devoid of distinction, however, for it was here that the Rev. Stephen Ivey, a prominent and fruitful educator in 1878 established a school under the auspices of the Cape Fear Baptist Association.

This school ever since its influence in the town has always been a source of pride to the people anywhere take me in their school and in education than do the people of Fairmont. Fairmont or Ashpole, as it then was incorporated in 1901

Bank of Fairmont

An Institution That has secured an Important Part in Industrial Development of Fairmont.

The Bank of Ashpole was organized on the 12th day of February 1904 with an authorized capital of \$20,000 \$9,500 of which was paid in and on the 26th day of June the same year began business in the brick store now occupied by the people's Barber shop. At the first meeting of the stock holders the following seven men were elected directors: A. S. Thompson, R. O. Pittman, A. J. Floyd, Dr. J. P. Brown, A. N. Mitchell, O. I. Floyd, and F. L. Blue, this board of directors immediately elected the following officers: A. S. Thompson, President. Dr. J. P. Brown, Vice-Pres. F. L. Blue, Cashier. For five years the bank did a consistently progressive business in this stand but the busi-

tribute to her merchants.

It is the strategic point for a large town and its rapid growth and development bears out the truth of this statement. The cardinal interest of Fairmont is in leaf tobacco and owing to its strategic position it has become the tobacco metropolis of Robeson county. Last year over four million pounds of leaf tobacco was sold on the floor of its two warehouses and approximately \$1,500,000 was paid to Robeson County farmers in return.

This year another huge warehouse has been erected and opened and it is only natural to suppose that even more tobacco will be sold here this year. Along with tobacco of course cotton for the ascendancy owing to the favorable rates from Wilmington via L. and the great amount of cotton raised in this county last year over 11,000 bales were marketed.

To the investors of capital or the homeseeker no town offers more alluring inducements than Fairmont. Situated in a fertile country settled by a thrifty people, law-abiding and God-fearing, who largely raise their own supplies. The rapid growth of Fairmont in the past few years furnishes no cause for surprise. The natural advantages of country is theirs and with native brawn and talent they are building up their section with magnificent strides, a hospitable people, the farmer with tobacco and the stranger within their gates is given a cordial reception. The visitor or stranger is struck with the beauty and modernness of the town. It is laid off after the fashion of a city its streets are paved its business houses are of brick and filled with immense stock of merchandise displayed with the up-to-datehess of city stores. Fairmont is comparatively a new town having only borne the name Fairmont since the year 1907. The derivation of the
