Several bills of this type are now under active consideration in Commerce and Finance Subcommittee, of which Broy-hill is the ranking Republican member. "We just recognize," he

stated, "that consumers are entitled to a clear presentation of the terms and conditions of any warranty or guarantee which accompanies a purchase. Such warranty should clearly state the service the purchaser will re-ceive and the terms under which the item will be replaced or repaired. Failure to state these terms in clear and understandable lan"At the same time," he continued, "we must work out legislation which will be both fair to the consumer and operable in the marketplace. It should not be the intent of the law to make a criminal of the well - meaning manufacturer or seller. Neither should we continue to allow the abuses which have flourished as a result of unclear and deceptive warranties."
