Chocolate Mint Pie by Jewel Warlick

3 egg whites Dash salt 1/2 teasp. vanilla 3/4 cup sugar 1/2 cup chopped nuts 3/4 cup crushed mint cookies

Beat egg whites and salt un-til soft peaks form, add sugar gradually and beat until stiff peaks form. With a spoon, carefully fold in crushed cookies, nuts and vanilla. Spread mixture evenly in a buttered pie pan. Cook in a 325 degree oven for 25 minutes. Cool thoroughly in refrigerator for several hours. Serve with whipped cream.






Top Spellers At Bethware and West
